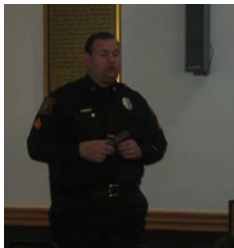

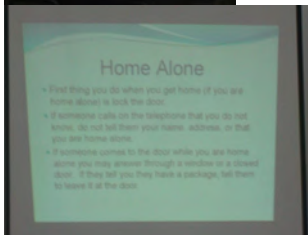

Students in primer - grade 2 participated in the "Stranger Danger" program, presented by Sgt. Dudash of the Edison Police Department. Below are some pointers presented to the children.

- Parents should set a secret password - this can be used by children to verify whether a person picking up the child was truly sent by the family.
- Never speak to a stranger. Children should view everyone as a stranger.
 - If a child is home alone, be sure to lock the doors.
 - If a child is home alone and answers the phone, don't tell caller that you're home alone
 - Children should never use the internet without supervision.
- When using the internet, children should never give personal information or pictures of themselves.
 - If somebody grabs you, you should yell, bite, kick and scream to get away.
 - Use 911 for emergencies only.

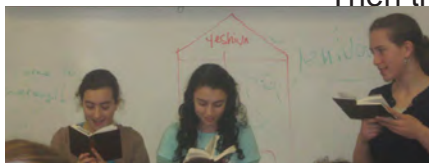
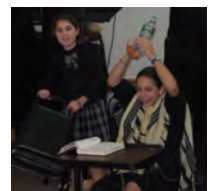
